Resource Management

Forest Practice Program:

Plan Submissions (through 10/31/2018):

- **THP submissions:** The number of THP submissions through October 2018 was approximately 9% higher than October 2017 (223 compared to 204 in 2017).
- **NTMP submissions:** The total number of NTMP submissions for October 2018 was 15% higher than October 2017 (15 compared to 13 in 2017). One-hundred sixty-one (161) NTOs were submitted in October 2018 compared to one-hundred forty-five (145) for October 2017.
- **Exemption Notice submissions:** Exemption submissions were approximately 19% lower compared to October last year (1,656 compared to 2,051 in 2017). The number of Drought Mortality Exemptions filed through October this year was approximately 73% lower than last year (185 compared to 693 in 2017); the acreage covered was approximately 70% lower (23,264 acres compared to 76,389 acres in 2017).
- **Emergency Notice submissions:** Emergency Notice submissions were significantly higher in October 2018 than October 2017 (226 compared to 82 in 2017). Likewise, the amount of acreage under Emergencies increased significantly over October 2017 (23,264 acres compared to 9,949 acres in 2017).
- **Plan Approval:** The number of THPs approved in October 2018 was approximately 26% higher than the number approved in October 2017 (225 compared to 179 in 2017). The number of NTMPs approved in October 2018 was approximately 17% higher than the number approved in October 2017 (14 compared to 12 in 2017).

Watershed Protection Program Update:

- The Exemption and Emergency (EX-EM) Notice effectiveness monitoring pilot project includes fuel treatment, watershed, and wildlife components. Progress has been made on report writing and data analyses. However, the first draft will not be completed by the internal deadline of December 3 due to WERT assignments.
- The final Watercourse Crossing Design Workshop took place on November 13th in Redding and in the Whiskeytown National Recreational Area, which was burned in July by the Carr Fire. In total, 5 crossing workshops were held between July and November, with approximately 200 resource professionals attending.

- Watershed Protection Program staff continue to work on the AB 1492 Campbell Creek Planning Watershed Pilot Project final report, and the revised AB 1492 Ecological Performance Measure white paper titled “Monitoring and assessment of California Coniferous and Mixed-Coniferous Forest Ecosystems Under Assembly Bill 1492.”

**Timber Regulation and Forest Restoration Fund (TRFRF) Activities:
[Updated from the TRFRF Database (01/01/2018 through 10/31/2018)]**

- Since January 1, 2018, the Department has spent 132,840 hours in conducting Forest Practice Program activities funded by TRFRF. An additional 8,992 hours of Forest Practice Program activities not funded by TRFRF has also been completed. Combined, Department staff has recorded 141,832 hours of Forest Practice-related activities through October 31, 2018.

Resource Protection and Improvement Program

Urban and Community Forestry (UCF):

- Agreements for all 2017/18 CCI Grant projects are fully signed. Workshops for the next grant cycle (2018-2019 Prop-68 & CCI) are complete and a webinar is available on our Grants Webpage. Concept proposals for Prop-68 and CCI projects are due on November 29. The Director approved a new member of the California Urban Forestry Advisory Committee (CUFAC). Brian Biancardi, a PG&E Vegetation Management Supervisor, will represent the Electric Utility Position for CUFAC.

Demonstration State Forests:

Boggs Mountain and Los Posadas

- The Forest Manager met with Amy Patten of the CNPS at Las Posadas to look for seed from Napa County bluebell.

- The Forest Manager met with Napa County Fire and the Napa County Land trust in support of the development of a community evacuation route through Las Posadas.

Jackson

- The fall Jackson Advisory Group (JAG) meeting was held on November 5th. The meeting reviewed two proposed THPs (Bear Gulch and Parlin 16) as well as a proposed PG&E transmission danger tree project that will also be a Class III timber sale. The JAG concurred with the proposed projects as consistent with the JDSF Forest Management Plan.
- The JDSF staff participated in an organizational meeting for a Redwood Coop on November 6th with other redwood timberland owners to discuss seed availability throughout the region and explore cooperative efforts to maintain a diverse seed bank for reforestation projects.
- The Recreation Task Force met at the end of October. Main discussion topics were updating members with recreation improvements completed this year and trails. There is considerable interest in opening trails affected by this year’s harvest operations in the Caspar Watershed.
- Operations on all timber sales have ceased. See chart below for approximate revenue totals for the 2018 calendar year.

LaTour

- On Nov 5th, the Department of General Services harvested the Capitol Christmas Tree. This year they selected a 105-foot-tall, 25” white fir.
- LDSF hosted the Second Annual Demonstration State Forest Managers meeting. In total, 20 persons from the program attended the day two event.

Mountain Home

- On October 24 MHDSF hosted a tour for members of the Southern Sierra Prescribed Fire Council to examine and discuss some of the successes and failures of prescribed/managed fire use at MHDSF.
- Forest, Camp, and Unit staff conducted a prescribed burn on 60 acres of the 65-acre Galena Burn Unit on October 24 and 25. The burn was successful in meeting all management objectives.

Soquel

- SDSF staff participated in electrofishing with consulting fisheries biologist, Don Alley, and his staff for four days in Soquel Creek. This monitoring has been conducted annually to assess fish populations in four reaches in the forest since the early 1990s. Discussions were started with CDFW to take the lead on a long-term MOU for electrofishing starting next year.

Lewis A. Moran Reforestation Center (LAMRC):

- The LAMRC unexpectedly received an additional 184 bushels of cones, primarily incense cedar and red fir. This brings the total received for this year up to 731.5 bushels. While this year's total received was better than expected, it is still over 200 bushels less than 2017.
- LAMRC has begun receiving portions of the new hybrid greenhouse/shadehouse. Delivery is expected to be completed by the end of November.

California Forest Improvement Program (CFIP):

- A new round of reforestation-only funding from the California Climate Investments initiative (GGRF) has become available to the program. Like the High-Speed Rail Authority funding, this potential funding will also require prospective projects to incorporate carbon sequestration estimations.

Forest Pest Management:

- A new outbreak of Gold Spotted Oak Borer (GSOB) has been found in the town of Oak Glen in San Bernardino County. This is the first outbreak of GSOB in the county. Staff will be working on expanding the Zone of Infestation for GSOB.
- Staff will be working with other agency personnel to propose bark beetle control in Torrey Pines State Park to help protect the extremely rare pine species.
- Staff assisted the US Forest Service in aerial surveys in northern California. There has been a significant increase in tanoak mortality along the north coast related to sudden oak death disease from infections that likely occurred 2 years ago. Final results for mortality from the aerial surveys will be released soon.
- Incense Cedar trees of all ages have been dying statewide. Incense cedar scale has been found on many of the trees causing significant damage and possibly causing mortality.

Climate and Energy Program:

- Staff continue to support applicants to the Forest Health Grant Program, which will award up to \$155 million in conjunction with the Fire Prevention Grant Program. Applications for the Forest Health grant program are due January 29.

- Public workshops have begun for the Natural and Working Lands Implementation Plan. Climate and Energy will continue working with Natural Resources Agency to draft and release the final plan.
- Climate and Energy is supporting Government Operations with a Cross Laminated Timber design competition, launched in October 2018. Winners will be awarded \$500,000.

Forest Management Task Force:

- The Task Force met on November 19, 2018. The meeting was recorded and the webinar and supporting materials are available at www.CAForestTaskForce.org.
- The 2018 Legislative season resulted in several bills, enrolled by the Legislature, and signed by Governor Brown that mandate activities of the Forest Management Task Force (FMTF). Prior to this legislation, the FMTF had only been mandated by the May 2018 Executive Order. Relevant bills include SB 901, AB 1981, AB 2091, and AB 2518.
- The Task Force will meet on December 10 from 1-4 p.m. in the Coastal Room of CalEPA, 1001 I St, Sacramento, CA 95812.

FIRE PROTECTION

Fire Protection Program

Law Enforcement/Civil Cost Recovery

- Last month, CAL FIRE Law Enforcement made 9 arrests and issued 45 citations (excluding PRC 4291).
- Last month, CAL FIRE received \$125,691 resulting from Civil Cost Recovery actions.
- On Friday, October 26, 2018, Cottonwood resident Samuel Villa Scholfield, 19, was arrested and booked into the Shasta County Jail on suspicion of arson following a series of structure and wildland fires in the Cottonwood and Anderson areas of Shasta County, dating back to July 2018. The arrest was made by the Shasta County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with CAL FIRE and the Shasta County Arson Task Force. A first-degree murder charge was filed in connection with an October 7 fire that killed an 86-year-old woman. In total, Scholfield is charged with 54 felonies, including murder, attempted murder and 52 counts of arson.
- On Saturday, October 27, 2018, CAL FIRE law enforcement officers arrested Nassar Albadwi, 45, for arson to the wildland, following the investigation into a wildland fire on Lake Road approximately 1.3 miles south of Highway 132 near the community of La Grange in Stanislaus County. The fire burned approximately three acres of grass and oak woodlands. A witness provided a suspect description.

Fire Protection Operations

- All staff have been involved in directly supporting the State Operations Center, the Camp, and the Woolsey fires over the last three weeks.
- To date, including installs in the Santa Clara Unit (SCU), we have completed 702 AVL/MDT mobile installs. Mendocino Unit (MEU) installs are scheduled to begin January 8, 2019. A Mobile Equipment "Install Trailer" is proving to be an efficiency booster and a good base of operations, minimizing impact to the Unit's normal shop schedule.
- Progress has been made on a draft UAS/Drone Policy handbook. CAL FIRE's policies will mirror those of federal partners, as they have already been published. This will allow for continuity between inter-agency partners regarding training, utilization, and management of these platforms and their resultant data.

Aviation Management Unit/Tactical Air Operations

- November was a very busy month with the Camp and Woolsey fires to staff Call-When-Needed aircraft and maintain operational readiness of our fleet.
- Activation of all Large and Very Large Call When Needed (CWN) airtankers took place immediately with very quick response from vendors and cooperators.
- Fixed-wing aviation assets were unavailable for most of the first day on the Camp incident due to high winds and severe turbulence. Several attempts were made to operate in the area, but it was not safe to do so and would have been ineffective due to winds.
- Significant rain occurred in the central and north state during the week of Thanksgiving and all Northern Region Air Attack Bases are moving their aircraft to McClellan for maintenance. For now, two S-2T's and one OV-10 will be moved to McClellan Reload base and staffed there for the Northern Region.
- Almost all of the CWN tankers have been released with the exception of one still on at Ramona.
- Three Exclusive Use airtankers will go off contract on 12/10 and six Exclusive Use helicopters will go off contract on 12/15.

Mobile Equipment

- Equipment delivery times are extending out 60 - 90 days at a time on all new vehicles and custom made bodies by the vendors.
- Fiscal Year 2017 vehicles continue to arrive.
- California Highway Patrol will be unable to accommodate outfitting our 130 CAL FIRE utility vehicles due to their own workload as they have in the past. We will seek support of the Regions and Units to outfit and distribute the vehicles.

- The CAL FIRE Fleet Acquisition Plan will be ready for Department of General Services Review by January 1, 2019. This is the earliest we have ever turned the plan in for their review. Once approved, CAL FIRE can begin purchasing vehicles utilizing Fiscal Year 2018 funds.

Cooperative Fire Program

Conservation Camp Program

- All participants at the Ventura Training Center have passed the Public Safety First Aid written final examination with a score of 80% or higher. Tutoring support services have been established and are assisting the participants with the academic portions of the training.
- The statewide Conservation Camps population for Wednesday, November 21, 2018: The current statewide shortage of fire crew members assigned to fire crews is 969 (A decrease of 61 from 1030 as of November 7, 2018). The inmate population stands at 84% (+1%) of capacity while crew capacity stands at 71% (+3%).

Local Government Program

- After 21 years with CAL FIRE, Deputy Chief Tom Hostetter, Local Government Program manager, will retire effective December 21, 2018. It is anticipated his successor will be appointed in December, allowing a brief transition prior to Chief Hostetter's retirement.
- Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019 Local Government Fire Protection Reimbursement Agreements which have completed the preliminary review process remain at 92% of total; Agreements which have been fully executed and approved are at 66%. FY 2019-2020 Agreements have not been submitted for approvals yet. Program anticipates they will begin to arrive after the release of revised salary and benefit rates in January 2019.

State-Federal Program

- On November 12, the White House approved California's request for a Presidential Major Disaster Declaration bolstering the emergency responses to fires in Butte (Camp Fire), Los Angeles and Ventura Counties (Hill and Woolsey Fires). A Presidential Major Disaster Declaration helps people in the impacted counties through eligibility for support including crisis counseling, housing and unemployment assistance and legal services. It also provides public assistance to help state, tribal and local governments with ongoing emergency response and recovery, including the repair and replacement of disaster-damaged facilities and infrastructure, including roads, bridges and utilities. The declaration includes hazard mitigation, which helps state and local governments reduce the risks and impacts of future disasters.

Safety/EMS Program

- During the first 24-hour period of the Camp Fire, the CAL FIRE Safety Program initiated daily calls to Incident Management Team (IMT) Safety Officers to assist with sharing safety resources, disseminating information, providing accident reviews and prevention.
- On the Camp Fire, during the first operational period, two accidents occurred resulting in five (5) firefighters suffering serious burns. On November 8, at approximately 3:00 PM while preplanning and preparing for a firing operation, one (1) Fire Captain and two (2) inmate firefighters suffered burns and were transported to a burn center for treatment. During the same operational period, on November 9, 2018, at approximately 6:00 AM, a fire engine crew acting on a threatened residential structure were burned when a propane tank exploded. One (1) Fire Captain and one (1) Fire Fighter 1 suffered burns and were transported and treated at a local hospital.
- On November 15, at approximately 12:01 AM, a firefighter assigned to the Woolsey Incident was struck by a civilian vehicle while resting during a shift on the fire line. While lying on the ground adjacent to a fire engine, a civilian vehicle left the roadway and drove over the firefighter. The injured firefighter was transported by helicopter to the local trauma center for evaluation. The firefighter suffered minor injuries and was released the same day.
- On November 18, at approximately 0235 hours, resources were dispatched to the Buzzard Incident, a vegetation fire in Santa Cruz County. Three firefighters suffered minor injuries. They were traversing upslope to improve the fire line when they heard the sound of falling trees. None of the firefighters were struck by the falling trees and all injuries occurred during their retreat to safety. All three were transported to a local hospital for evaluation and treatment and released to modified duty.
- The California Emergency Medical Services Authority (EMSA), announced the recipients of California Emergency Medical Services Awards for 2018. Initiated in 2007, the annual awards honor and recognize exceptional acts and service by individuals working or volunteering in California's emergency medical system. CAL FIRE's Medical Director, Dr. Dave Duncan, received the California Medical Director of the Year award.
- The CAL FIRE EMS Program staff processed 35 internal Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) recertification applications in the month of November.

Training Program

- The Training Center graduated both Firefighter Academy Class 10 and Company Officer Academy class 5 on November 9, 2018.
- Graduated Emergency Command Center Class 123 on November 16, 2018.
- Started the first week of Leadership Level 1 and Level 2 course development, with a tentative completion date for development in January 2019.

- The Training Center instructional staff for Lone and Riverside are working together the week of November 26 - 30 to review 2019 curriculum.

Office of the State Fire Marshal

Wildland Fire Prevention Engineering

- The Program has been heavily involved in overseeing the collection of damage inspection data from the Camp and Woolsey Fires. Data on nearly 20,000 structures was collected for future analysis.
- Staff were in attendance to the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) SB901 scoping hearing. The program continues to support CPUC in their development of the new Utility Mitigation Plan Program and the updates directed under SB 901.

Fire Plan

- Staff are working on the annual Fire Plan Report that will be presented to the Board in the new year.

CAIRS (California All Incident Reporting System)

- The department is on track implementing a new incident reporting system (CALFIRS - CAL FIRE Incident Reporting System). Despite fire activity, a series of train the trainer courses were held that included all 21 of CAL FIRE's Units.

Land Use Planning

- This month staff worked with the National Fire Protection Association to renew 8 Firewise USA Communities. To date there are 168 active Firewise USA communities which ranks California #3 in the nation.
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- Land Use Planning staff were busy this month assisting with the wildfires, many of which were assigned as damage inspection specialists and managers.

Fire Prevention Grants / SRA Fee Program

- The 2018-19 Fire Prevention Grants applications are being accepted through December 19, 2018. Up to \$155 million is available for fire prevention and forest health grants.
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- FY 2017-18 Fire Prevention Grant Agreements continue to be signed to authorize work to begin.
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Former SRA Fee Program

- Staff continue to close out the SRA Fee Program. Data migration and records retention are on-going with a third-party vendor used during the fee assessment.
